FIRST SUPPLEMENT to the HISTORY of the NEW MEXICO SOCIETY of the SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (1969-1979)

"The DECADE of the SEVENTIES"

"Those who do not remember history are doomed to relive it" Not all the State Fair awards are shown.." For writing this narrative there was available 59 typed pages of chronicles, preserved as one of the duties of the Historian NMSSAR. Where additional information has become available prior to the date of the final draft, some of that has been included in this supplement and is to be found mostly in the Appendix.

On 12 July 1975, National Society SAR approved the charter application for Hobbs, N.M. chapter. That brought to four the number of chapters of NMSSAR. In recent times, however, chapters other than Albuquerque have been dormant and in the seventies, there have been occasional attempts to revitalize them. NMSSAR attained a membership of 164 for the year 1969 and since has remained at or near that plateau. As of 1979, the membership was slightly less at 157, down perhaps due to the near collapse of those chapters other than Albuquerque.

As a fitting conclusion to his many years as Registrar NMSSAR, Compatriot Robert G. Norfleet, II, arranged for the binding into book form then all available NMSSAR copies of application for membership. There are six volumes of 100 applications each. Prior to the end of his term of duty, Compatriot Norfleet had typed and processed to completion more than 250 applications, a truly monumental effort. Earlier, Compatriot Norfleet had been awarded the Patriot Medal for his meritorious SAR service.

Some of the activities of NMSSAR during the decade of the seventies have included, the exhibition at the annual New Mexico State Fair of articles of patriotic and historic interest. In recent years, the NMSSAR booth has been decorated with the assistance of members of Children of the American Revolution, Zebulon Pike Chapter.

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For the prize-winning entries NMSSAR has presented the Horace R. McDowell award, and the Albuquerque Chapter SAR has awarded the Clinton M. Roth trophy. These presentations recognize two distinguished NMSSAR compatriots. Examples of some of the exhibits have included a flintlock rifle and surveying instruments of the period of the American Revolution, documents, books, letters, early military equipment and insignia. Occasionally, participating in these exhibitions were members of the New Mexico Genealogical Society, which had been organized in 1961 by NMSSAR compatriots with some help from the Daughters of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Colonists, and United Daughters of the Confederacy, and other New Mexico patriotic and hereditary societies.

NMSSAR has continued with the tradition of awarding medals to outstanding ROTC cadets of universities and high schools throughout the state. The Albuquerque Chapter has been responsible for the high school awards in that city while NMSSAR has presented medals to the universities and high schools in the remainder of the state. Silver ROTC medals were awarded annually to the students at the university level and bronze medals were awarded to high school cadets each year.

Another continuing joint project of NMSSAR and Albuquerque Chapter has been the participation of compatriots at naturalization ceremonies to provide a welcome to our new citizens and to present them with certificates.

Funds to send a boy to a state-wide conference known as BOY'S STATE, were provided by NMSSAR annually. This conference is intended to aid the participant in gaining actual experience in the field of government and civic affairs.

Most luncheon and dinner meetings were held at Kirtland Air Force Base Officers' Club (West) throughout the decade.

THE DECADE OF THE SEVENTIES

1970

A historical review of the activities of the NMSSAR begins with the ending of the foregoing basic history as of 14 June 1969. The events and data recorded in this supplemental accounting covers the period of ten years which ends 14 June 1979.

The sixties were ushered out by Chapter and State society activities in the last one-half of 1969 with a Tri-State meeting in Denver on November 8, held at the Radiant Temple of the Eastern Star, on which occasion the distinguished guest was the President General James B. Gardner. President General Gardner was the principal speaker at the New Mexico Veteran's Day dinner meeting on November 10 in Santa Fe at La Posada Inn. Dr. Jan Pieter Voute, M.D., was awarded the Silver Good Citizenship medal for his unusual contributions to the field of Public Health.

Prior to the Veteran's Day dinner, the Albuquerque Chapter had a meeting at the Alvarado Hotel for awarding the State Fair trophies. The Horace R. McDowell Minuteman Award was presented by Archie McDowell, the donor's brother, to Ben Lomond Roberts, for his entry in the SAR Historic and Patriotic booth at the Fair, of a Kentucky flintlock long rifle and powder horn. The Clinton M. Roth Memorial Award was made at this same meeting by Edith Roth, wife of the donor, to George W. Lambert, Spanish-American War veteran who was present at the dinner in full Spanish-American War uniform. Mr. Lambert was 92 years of age.

Washington's Birthday dinner was held 21 February 1970. The guest speaker was Lt. Gen. H. C. Donnelly, General Manager of the Atomic Energy Commission. He spoke on the subject, "What to Expect of the Seventies".

Col. Edward T. Johnson was elected President of the State Society in June of 1969, but was claimed by death soon thereafter. At the Flag Day dinner on 13 June 1970, a certificate of appreciation was given to his widow, Margaret R. Johnson, by State President Charles C. Campbell. President Johnson's passing was commemorated by the observation of a period of silence.

On 6 August 1970, President General Walter Martin and Mrs. Martin were given a reception at the dinner meeting held at Diamond Jim's in Albuquerque. Many DAR guests were present and the President General presented a Good Citizenship Gold Medal to Norris Bradbury, Director of Los Alamos National Laboratory to honor his retirement.

A Fall meeting of the Rocky Mountain District was held in the afternoon on November 7, and a workshop conducted by Vice President General James M. Caller, II. This workshop was attended by Dr. Hosea B. Willard, Trustee from Arizona, New Mexico's Trustee, Robert G. Luckey, and by other representatives of Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. A general discussion was had on ways to improve the societies of these states and other matters of general interest to those present. At the dinner meeting that evening, the Patriot's Medal was presented to Compatriot Joseph J. Mullens.

Just prior to the conclusion of the dinner meeting was the formation of the Rocky Mountain District Council. Members of this Council were to consist of the Vice President General of the Rocky Mountain District, the National Trustees of the three states and the State Presidents. The Council was to hold two meetings a year -- one in the Spring and later in the Fall. One meeting was to be in the state of the Vice President General and the other to be selected at the Fall meeting. Meeting dates were to be set by the Vice President General.

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Washington's Birthday dinner was held 19 February 1971, at Diamond Jim's restaurant with Professor Howard T. Dittmer of UNM as principal speaker. He discussed "The effect of over population on the environment".

At the Society Board of Managers meeting on 30 March, Treasurer George W. Browning reported that dues notices were sent out in January to 166 members. VPG James Caller reminded the Board of the Rocky Mountain District meeting in Denver on 12 April. New Mexico was to be represented by VPG Caller, President Charles C. Campbell and M. Thomas Muzzey.

On 12 June, the Flag dinner was addressed by Ben G. Hernendez, the Ex-Ambassador to Paraguay. His topic was "The Social Obligations of the Individual Regardless of Heritage". The meeting was held in the Sun Room at the Albuquerque Airport. Other guests were Lew Wallace, DAR Regent; Mrs. Charles Ocksrider and David Hunton, President of Montgomery Zebulon Pike CAR Chapter.

It was announced that the membership was now at a low figure of 144, down from 162.

Lt. Col. Watson Ambruster was elected President of the State Society. He reported that Robert C. Luckey was re-elected Trustee at the National Congress held in Atlantic City, N.J. Compatriot Luckey was awarded the Minuteman Medal at this congress and was appointed to serve on the Executive, Bicentennial and Budget Committees. Discussion was had concerning the formation of a chapter in Eastern New Mexico in the area of Clovis, Portales, or Hobbs-Lovington.

1971

President General Eugene C. McGuire and wife Paula, were guests at the Veterans' Day dinner on 11 November at Kirtland Air Force Base. His address was entitled "The Way We Wish to Live". At this meeting it was announced that Mrs. John Julian was awarded the Clinton M. Roth Award at the State Fair for a Minister's Civil War Kit. Philip Stober was the winner of the Horace R. McDowell Trophy for an exhibit of Revolutionary War Bayonets. Robert O. Norfleet was given a rosette by Past President General Tarbox for having obtained 5 new members.

At a meeting of the Board of Managers held at the home of President Watson Ambruster, Robert Luckey and Dr. W. V. Owen were authorized to proceed with compiling an interim or supplemental history of the State Society. The purpose was to preserve the history of the period from 14 June 1960, which date concluded the basic published volume of history and was to become the basis for the second volume. Discussion was also had concerning the establishment of a chapter at Tucumcari, but the minutes do not give the results of the discussion.

Washington's Birthday dinner was held at KAFB on 25 February 1972. It was a joint meeting of the Reserve Officers Association. The 60th Anniversary of the State of New Mexico and the National Defense Week were observed by President Watson Ambruster. The Dinner was well attended and Bart Brown, President of R.O.A., spoke briefly and former Congressman Thomas G. Morris spoke on "Americanism and What it Means to Me". Wallace Brown, Jr. was given his certificate of membership by Vice President General Dr. H. B. Willard.

The Rocky Mountain District Meeting was held on 22 April 1972 at the home of Robert G. Luckey. The District Banquet was held that evening at the Sundowner Motel. VPG Willard and wife Ruth were guests of honor. Other guests were Harold E. Rice and wife Lucille. The address, entitled "The Free Enterprise System" was given by Compatriot Ralph M. Pabst of Phoenix.

Flag Day Dinner was held 16 June 1972 at KAFB, West, and was interfered with by conflicting noise and part of the program was omitted. Diane Sutton, CAR, was given the Bronze Good Citizenship Medal by James G. Marsh. Mr. Dave Smoker

of TVI spoke on "Career Education in the Albuquerque Public Schools".

On 21 September, a Chapter Luncheon Meeting was held. Compatriot Robert G. Luckey spoke on "The Privilege of Living in the United States". It was reported that Compatriots Joseph Mullins and Col. Nelson Turner attended the Naturalization Ceremony on 15 August.

A Chapter Meeting was held 31 October and was the scene of an important discussion on the question "What is the Chapter's Mission?" A Committee, with Robert G. Norfleet as Chairman, and George Dickins, Robert Luckey, and James G. Marsh as members, was appointed to resolve the question. The Chapter voted to buy the President's Medallion, including the past two Presidents who did not get one.

The Rocky Mountain District Meeting on 11 November was attended by President General Ryall Morgan and Robert Luckey. On 13 November, the Veterans' Day Dinner was held at KAFB, West. PG Ryall Morgan spoke on "A Mess of Potage". Mrs. Carroll Hunton was awarded, in absentia, the SAR Medal of Appreciation. Sylvain Segal received the State Fair Minuteman award. Myron Sipf won the Clinton M. Roth Award. PG Morgan was presented an Indian Bowl and President Ambruster a Certificate of Appreciation. The Amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws regarding earlier collection of dues was unanimously passed. The 1973 officers for the Albuquerque Chapter, SAR, were elected at a noon meeting of the Chapter on January 12, 1973. The meeting was held at the Sundowner Motel.

A meeting of the Board of Managers of the Albuquerque Chapter was hosted by the new President, James Caller, at his home on January 22, 1973. The dates of the first three meetings of the Chapter were scheduled by the Board to occur on the third Tuesday of March, April, and May. A second meeting of the Board of Managers was scheduled for May 29, 1973, at which the dates of the remaining meetings of 1973 were to be determined. It was decided at this January 22 meeting that the Albuquerque Chapter, SAR, would assume the costs and also make the presentation of the SAR medals given locally to the outstanding ROTC cadets. The Chapter would also participate in all Naturalization Ceremonies and would support the activities at the booth of the Sons of the American Revolution at the New Mexico State Fair. The Clinton M. Roth Award at the Fair was to continue to be the responsibility of the Albuquerque Chapter. The Chapter was, in addition, to accept the responsibility for the Constitution Day Celebration for getting the Mayor to make a proclamation announcing the Constitution Week.

The New Mexico Society, SAR, met on Washington's Birthday, February 22, where Commander Ronald E. Smith spoke on seapower. Trustee Robert G. Luckey reported on his attendance at a National SAR meeting in Washington, D.C., February 3, 1973. He emphasized the importance of giving SAR medals to citizens, especially to Law Enforcement Officers. At the SAR Congress held on June 1, 1972, the New Mexico Society won the Ohio Award for obtaining the highest percentage of new members under thirty years of age. The next Congress will be held at the Breakers Hotel in Palm Beach, Florida, June 23-28, 1973.

The Albuquerque Chapter, SAR, met at the Sundowner Motel at noon on March 20, 1973. Compatriot Wallace S. Brown was installed by Compatriot Robert Norfleet as the 2nd Vice President of the Chapter to replace F. C. Alexander, who had resigned. Neck medallions were presented to Past Presidents Glen W. Goodloe and Charles B. Ocksrider by the current Chapter President, James M. Caller, II. The speaker for this meeting was H. D. Sivinski from the Sandia Laboratories, who spoke on "Man in Space".

A meeting of the Board of Managers of the State Society, SAR, was held after the Chapter luncheon. The Board discussed and planned a meeting with Vice President General Harold E. Rice to be held in Tucson, Arizona, on April 19, 1973. The meeting with V.P.G. Rice was cancelled, however, because of the lack of a quorum in Tucson.

The Board of Managers of the New Mexico Society met on April 10, 1973, at the home of Commander Dickens. It was decided by the Board that The Awards Committee would act independently of the Committee on the Patriot's Medal. Other medals which were not to be subject to the judgement of the Awards Committee were: the ROTC medals, the State Fair Awards, and the Douglass G. High oration contest. The membership of the SAR would be solicited for recommendations as to the general awards, and the Awards Committee would select names from the recommendations to present to the Board of Managers. The Board will either approve or veto each of the names recommended by the Awards Committee. A meeting of the Albuquerque Chapter, SAR, was held April 17, 1973, at which Thomas W. Hoover gave a summary of the accomplishments of the recent session of the New Mexico Legislature. Compatriot James C. Gravlin was appointed to serve on the Albuquerque Bicentennial Committee. Compatriot William J. Bingham was authorized to insert advertisements in the local newspapers which would urge citizens to fly the American Flag, especially on patriotic holidays.

The Flag Day Dinner of the State Society, SAR, was well attended on June 14, 1973. The outgoing President, Cmdr. George F. Dickens, gave his annual report, and Compatriot Robert G. Luckey was installed as the State SAR President for the coming year. Compatriot Win Buskirk was appointed as the Second Vice President to replace Charles B. Ocksrider, who had resigned the position. Ex-Governor, Thomas F. Bolack, spoke on "The Flag and Patriotism". Several medals and awards were presented as follows:

To Thomas F. Bolack, the gold SAR Good-Citizenship medal.

To CAR Tod Hirt, the bronze SAR Good-Citizenship medal.

To Col. Francis O. Wood, the SAR Patriot's medal. He had completed 50 years of SAR membership on October 8, 1972.

To George F. Dickens, the SAR Patriot's medal. To Vice President General Harold E. Rice, the SAR medal.

An honored guest at the Flag Day Dinner was Mrs. Edwina Tripplett, the Senior Vice President of the CAR for the Rocky Mountain Region.

At the National SAR Congress in Palm Beach, Florida, June, 1973, Compatriot Robert G. Luckey was elected as the Vice-President General, Rocky Mountain District. He was succeeded as State President by H. Clifton Wright. There was a meeting of the Rocky Mountain Council, SAR, on November 10, 1973, at the White Winrock Hotel. Ralph M. Pabst was nominated for Vice President General of the Rocky Mountain District for 1974. After the afternoon Council meeting there was a discussion of the possibility of the purchase of a new National Headquarters. At the banquet in the Crystal Room of the White Winrock Hotel that evening, President General, Marion H. Crawmer, and his wife, Kamma, reviewed the President General's speech, "War and What America Means to Us". There were eleven representatives present for the Council Meeting including:

1974

The Washington's Birthday dinner at Kirtland AFB was well attended and included CAR and DAR representatives. Sarah Lacy Jackson, Chairman of the NSDAR, spoke on the USA Bicentennial Celebration. At a Board of Managers meeting of the NMSAR, it was decided to present the James G. Marsh Memorial Award to an outstanding member of the Zebulon Pike CAR. The Boys' State Representative selected was Tod Hirt, CAR of Sandia High School.

The Flag Day dinner on June 13 was the date of the awarding of a Patriot medal to Watson Ambruster, II. It was given to Sue Ambruster since Watson was attending Boys' State.

The James G. Marsh Memorial Award was presented to Marsha Dean, CAR. She spoke on "CAR-SAR Relationships."

At a Board meeting on October 26, Dr. J. L. Burke, Jr.'s proposal to form a new SAR chapter in Hobbs was approved.

On November 10, the Veterans' Day dinner was held at KAFB Officers' Club East. President General Graham Clark and wife, Elizabeth, were guests. Dr. Clark spoke on the topic "Quo Vadis, America?" Gifts were presented to Dr. and Mrs. Clark and State Fair McDowell Award given to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Buffett. The Roth Award was won by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Neal.

The Rocky Mountain District Council meeting was held in Sun City, Arizona, November 30. Those attending and representing the NMSSAR were: Dr. Winfred Buskirk, H. Clifton Wright, Pres. NMSSAR, Robert G. Luckey, and Robert E. Hendricks.

Washington's Birthday dinner for the NMSSAR was held February 20 and Dr. Martin Fleck addressed the fifty members and guests on the subject "What's Right With America?"

Representatives of the Society assisting in the formation of a chapter at Hobbs, N.M., were Compatriots Wright, Luckey and Hendricks. Dr. J. L. Burke, Jr., was the ad hoc chairman to form the Hobbs chapter. On May 12, at a Chapter meeting, H. Park Shaw was appointed liaison for the Chapter with CAR. He had been previously appointed representative of the NMSSAR with CAR.

The NMSSAR was most interested in the Bicentennial Celebration scheduled for 1976. The Bicentennial Project Committee met May 27 and agreed to cooperate with the Military Order of World Wars in procuring patriotic cassettes and Listener's Guide for use in the Albuquerque Public Schools. The NMSSAR was committed to \$300.00. The Albuquerque Chapter was committed to \$300.00. Military Order of World Wars was committed to \$150.00 (\$750.00). These items were delivered in September and Compatriot Buskirk delivered them to the Audio-Visual Department of Albuquerque Public Schools.

The Flag Day dinner on June 12 was completed with presentation to David Hunton, CAR, of the James G. Marsh Memorial Award. Certificate of Appreciation and the Patriot Medal were presented to outgoing President H. Clifton Wright. Compatriot H. Park Shaw displayed the Bennington Flag and gave its history.

Compatriot Winfred C. Buskirk was duly elected President and installed. Later at a Board meeting on July 24, the charter for Hobbs, N.M. was approved with the date to be established later. The institution of the Hobbs Chapter was on September 20. Compatriot H. Park Shaw had moved in the September 16 Chapter meeting that the Chapter present a gavel to the new Hobbs Chapter. This was approved and the gavel delivered at the September 20 meeting.

Prior to the Veteran's Day dinner on November 1, a joint State and Chapter meeting was held and a discussion had with the visiting President General Lt. Col. Robert D. Savage. Several pertinent topics were discussed and reviewed such as: The SAR Magazine; the stamp urged by Compatriot Shaw; the Liberty Bell Foundation; and the tactics to attract more young men to the Society. At the dinner, President General Savage spoke on "Citizen-Soldier" and "The Deteriorating Ratio of the U.S. Military Strength to that of Russia Under Detente."

The Hobbs Chapter on November 11, approved as a part of the Bicentennial Project, to place a framed copy of the Declaration of Independence in each of the public schools in Hobbs.

The Rocky Mountain District Council meeting was held in Denver on December 14. Compatriot H. Clifton Wright was nominated for Vice President General for the election to be held in Philadelphia in June of 1976. (The Vice President General at this meeting was not shown in the minutes of the December 14 meeting.) The Albuquerque Chapter celebrated its 25th anniversary by meeting January 12, 1976, at La Placita Restaurant. Chapter Officers were duly elected and installed. The Roth Award was presented to Maryllyn Widlund.

The Hobbs Chapter met the next day in Hobbs and presented to the Superintendent of Schools, Roger Luginbill, a framed copy of the Declaration of Independence for exhibiting in the school administration building. This was in furtherance of the plan of that Chapter to make these framed exhibits available and 6 more copies were approved for purchase at a cost of \$6.50 each.

The George Washington Birthday dinner on February 22, was addressed by Barbara Walker, President of Zebulon Pike Society CAR. She spoke on "George Washington". At a later Chapter meeting, Miss Walker was given a \$50.00 check from the NMSSAR to aid the Zebulon Pike Society CAR.

The Albuquerque Chapter met on March 16, and it was significant that Compatriot Robert G. Norfleet presented at this meeting a SAR rosette to the 46th member he was responsible for joining the NMSSAR.

The State Board approved the candidacy of H. Clifton Wright for Vice President General for the Rocky Mountain District at the Philadelphia Congress. Robert G. Luckey was candidate for Trustee at the Congress and these two were delegates to represent NMSSAR as well as be candidates.

Vice President General Wright at the Board of Managers meeting July 24, reported that the Philadelphia Congress authorized the sale of the National Headquarters in Washington and to purchase a new site in Chevy Chase, Maryland. The Rocky Mountain District Council met on September 19 and Vice President General Clifton Wright was Chairman. President General Matthew B. Sellers and wife Gene, were present. President General Sellers presided during the discussion by representatives from Colorado and Arizona, as well as New Mexico. A number of points affecting the Societies involved were discussed such as: types of meetings to hold, increasing membership, the SAR Magazine, formation of new chapters, etc.

There was a special joint meeting of the State Society and the Albuquerque Chapter on the night of September 19 at 7:00 p.m., at the Ramada Inn East. Several awards were made. President General Sellers spoke of past and current conditions of the Society.

At a Board meeting October 16, it was shown that Ernest W. Hall had reached 50 years as a member of the NMSSAR. Robert Norfleet was to arrange for a program to deliver the commendation certificate to be awarded to Compatriot Hall. This certificate was delivered on November 9 by Compatriot Norfleet and Winfred Buskirk, and was reported to the November 11 Veterans' Day dinner meeting. Also at this meeting, the McDowell State Fair trophy was presented to Joseph Miller. His entry was a letter signed by George Washington. Roth Award was presented to Alma Fricke for a collection of colonial artifacts.

It will be remembered that, in connection with the Bicentennial Committee of NMSSAR, Compatriot Joseph Mullins had labored long and diligently on a bill (N.M. State Senate Bill #235) to create in New Mexico a <u>State</u> Bicentennial Committee. The bill passed and was signed into law by the Governor of New Mexico on April 2, 1969! The Governor then named Compatriot Mullins to the chairmanship of that new, special committee. Both the Chapter and State Societies had discussed at general meetings the part the Society should pla in celebrating the Bicentennial. Robert G. Luckey, Trustee and Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, had announced the display of patriotic and historic items for public viewing. Compatriot Luckey at a joint Chapter-State meeting on June 7, called attention to the excellent displays in the Winrock shopping center. The stores participating in the Bicentennial were: Strombergs, who had a SAR displa Wards, who exhibited Lew Wallace DAR exhibit; and Foggs Jewelers, who put on view the items from Charles Dibrell, DAR.

During that June 7 meeting, Mrs. John Kruger talked on the history of certain flags used in the development of our 50 star flag and displayed them in her discussion.

The Business meeting approved amendments to the Constitution providing:

- President may succeed himself and serve two terms.
- 2. The immediate Past President remains on the Board if the President serves two terms.
- 3. Eliminating the rotating Board Members, after each of their terms was over.
- 4. Chapters were to have a member on the Board.

Compatriot H. Park Shaw was appointed CAR Senior President.

The James G. Marsh Award, which had been previously considered an award for a Zebulon Pike member, was enlarged to state-wide coverage. Thus, an outstanding CAR anywhere in New Mexico is eligible for consideration.

Note: During the observance of the 1776-1976 Bicentennial, tape cassettes and the associated reader's guides were provided for the Albuquerque Public Schools as a joint project of NMSSAR, Albuquerque Chapter SAR, and the Military Order of World Wars! President General Sellers in his meeting with the Trustees in the Fall of 1976, had advised that the Chevy Chase Building in Maryland was not suitable for purchase of the National Headquarters. The Building in Washington used as National Headquarters, was then up for sale. At the February 22 dinner meeting, Trustee Luckey, who had attended the Trustees' meeting then reported the National Headquarters had been sold for \$800,000.00 to the government of the "Ivory Coast". Dr. Eldred Harrington spoke on "George Washington".

Compatriot Robert G. Luckey asked to be approved by the NMSSAR for the national office of Treasurer General.

At the Milwaukee Congress in June 25-29, 1977, Compatriot Robert G. Luckey was elected Treasurer General. The Milwaukee Congress was held from June 25 to 29.

The Flag Day dinner on June 14 was presented with a slate of nominees for the State Society. Wallace Brown was elected President and Wendell Hagood First Vice President. On August 27, Compatriot Brown asked to be relieved of his position. This was granted and First Vice President Hagood was duly approved as President on September 3, 1977.

November 10 was the Veteran's Day Observance with the State Society meeting at KAFB for dinner. Vice President General Lawrence Jones of Arizona was the speaker using the topic "We Still Have to Stand Up to be Counted".

At this meeting, President Hagood read a resolution of the Board of Managers approving the candidacy of Compatriot Robert G. Luckey for the Office of President General. The membership unanimously approved of the Resolution.

The Clinton M. Roth trophy was won by Ernest Hill for his exhibit at the New Mexico State Fair. Compatriot William E. Blackwell was awarded the McDowell trophy. President General Wilson K. Barnes visited the New Mexico Society on February 17. He was met at the Airport where members lunched. They later met for discussions at the home of President Hagood, concerning our Society and its growth. Judge Barnes had prepared a paper on recruiting new members and establishing new chapters. A copy of this outline procedure was given to the NMSSAR for use.

The dinner meeting was well attended and Judge Barnes spoke on the "Effects of Judicial Decisions on the Constitution and the Rights of the American People".

Margaretta Bodwell, State Regent of the DAR, spoke at the Flag Day dinner of the Society. Her topic "Your Government -- Your Responsibility". The silver Good Citizenship medal was awarded U. S. Attorney Victor Ortega. The Law Enforcement Commendation medal was presented to Police Chief Bob V. Stover. Miss Harriette Veck, State President of New Mexico CAR, received the James Marsh Award.

A report of the Louisville Congress was made by the New Mexico delegation. Wendell Hagood was elected Trustee and Robert G. Luckey, Treasurer General. Compatriots Winfred Buskirk and H. Clifton Wright were the delegation representing NMSSAR, in addition to the two elected officials. President General Calvin Chunn had been elected at the Louisville Congress and was present at the November 10 meeting honoring Veterans' Day.

World War I veterans were honored at this dinner. They were John Burton, Lt. Comdr. George Dickins, Charles Dickson, Col. Otis Francis Wood, Ernest Hall and Gen. William A. Poe. The Good Citizenship Medal was given to G. Ward Fenley for his newspaper column "Action Line".

Former city councilman Jack Rex was presented the Horace R. McDowell Award. A hobby gun collector, Frank W. Chamberlayne of Albuquerque and Florida, received the Clinton M. Roth Memorial Award. President General Chunn discussed at length with members of the Society at a luncheon meeting, the decision to acquire a building in Louisville, Kentucky for the National Headquarters. The location of the building is 1000 South 4th Street and was formerly a Masonic Temple by the Grand Masonic Lodge. It is of white limestone, built in 1953, two stories and a basement; 20,000 square feet of floor space is available. President General Chunn recommended the final acquisition by the trustees.

The Society gave President General Chunn an item of Indian-made jewelry. A book with officers' autographs went to Vice-President General McGrew. Complimentary dinners went to all attendant medal winners and guest speakers.

A New Mexico State flag, for permanent display here, was sent to National Headquarters.

1979

"A pleasant, happy, comfortable year, an era of good feeling among its members", is the way President William O. Bramlett characterizes the 1978-1979 administrative year of the Society in his report at year's end.

The Hobbs Chapter in an early January 16th meeting wholeheartedly approved the candidacy of Compatriot Luckey for President General.

In the Congress at Louisville (May 27-31, 1978), James G. McGrew of Colorado had been elected Vice President General for the Rocky Mountain District and he, with his wife Jan, attended the February 23 dinner meeting at KAFB Officers' Club, West. Vice President General McGrew was the dinner speaker.

Compatriot Jack C. Redman, and his fellow Albuquerque physician, John A. Bennett, donned scuba gear and stepped off the stern of a dive boat near Bermuda on April 5, to an incredible meeting 30 feet below the surface of the sea! This meeting was a reunion at the wreck of the English ship "Sea Venture" upon which their respective tenth great-grandfathers had been shipwrecked in 1609! Also on that ill-fated ship was a future governor of Virginia, George Yeardley, later knighted. (For details, please see page 17 of the SAR magazine, Fall issue, 1979).

The Society through Vice-President Dufft and Chancellor Mullins, presented SAR Certificates of Citizenship to citizens inducted through the Albuquerque U. S. Bureau of Naturalization during the year. A letter of appreciation went to Mrs. Rella Sanders, secretary to Compatriot Mullins for her work on this project. The most prestigious medal of this year, the Patriot Medal, went to Past-President, G. Wendell Hagood.

The State Society, in cooperation with the Albuquerque Chapter, acting through Compatriot Watson Ambruster, awarded eighteen SAR medals to R.O.T.C. cadets of the Army, the Air Force and the Marines in college and high school units over the state.

At the Washington Birthday dinner, the SAR medal of appreciation for the year went to Mrs. David (Nancy) Bruyere, Senior President Zebulon Montgomery Pike Society, Children of the American Revolution. The medal marked her coordination of the CAR members' work on the New Mexico State Fair SAR Historical Exhibit.

Bicentennial "birthday covers" went to Cathy Meikle and Gretchen Peterson of Del Norte High School, along with SAR certificates of appreciation for their assistance in the Flag Day celebration on June 14. The girls delivered orations at this meeting. Their speeches had won the highest honors in previous state-wide secondary school oratorical meets.

On April 21, 1979, the Board of Managers had officially approved the candidacy of Compatriot Robert G. Luckey for the office of the President General, 1979-1980 term, his election subject to the 89th NMSSAR Congress scheduled to meet at San Diego, California in June 1979.

Declaring their support for Luckey, the delegates to the Congress from New Mexico were J. R. Calhoun, G. F. Dickins, C. W. Hagood, H. C. Wright, and W. O. Bramlett. Led by Hagood, the group coined such slogans as "Lucky is the day Luckey leads the way", and "With malice toward none, the term should be one (year)". They made many personal appeals for voter support.

The opposition proved too strong. Dr. Calvin E. Chunn, of California, the incumbent opponent, was re-elected to a second term. The Naval Weapons Evaluation Facility of Albuquerque donated a memorial gift of \$56.85 to the Society honoring their co-worker Compatriot Hampton Wise Richardson, who died December 6, 1978. Signing the letter of transmittal was Commanding Officer of the facility, Capt. J. J. Lahr, USN. The donation went into the Memorial and Awards fund, and the donors were advised of its use.

Many wives gave freely of their time and effort during the year assisting their husbands in carrying on the work of the Society. Especially helpful were Mrs. James (Connie) Calhoun, who assisted the treasurer at dinners; Mrs. William E. (Jan) Blackwell, who lettered name tags, place cards and certificates; and Mrs. William O. (Florence) Bramlett, who kept coffee perking and the cookie plate filled during board meetings.

Thus ends the Saga of the Seventies, NMSSAR, on June 14, 1979, when President William O. Bramlett and associated officers completed their terms of office.
